The BlackRock Multi Asset Income: Moderate (MAPS) is a Separately Managed Account ("SMA") investment product where (a) BlackRock (the "Model Portfolio Provider") delivers a model portfolio (the "Third Party Model Portfolio") to Morgan Stanley; (b) Morgan Stanley, as investment adviser to the client, serves as portfolio manager for the SMA investment product; and (c) the SMA investment product is inspired by the Third Party Model Portfolio. These SMA investment products are referred to as "MAPS Third Party Strategies". As portfolio manager of the MAPS Third Party Strategies, Morgan Stanley may deviate from the Third Party Model Portfolios. However, Morgan Stanley generally intends to follow the Third Party Model Portfolios. The Third Party Model Portfolios will include mutual funds and ETFs that are affiliated with the Model Portfolio Provider and which pay fees and other compensation to the Third Party Model Provider and its affiliates. Over the long-term, the strategy generally is expected to have a level of risk similar to or lower than that of a blended benchmark of 50% MSCI World Index and 50% Bloomberg Barclays US Aggregate Bond Index. It invests in a diversified portfolio of mutual funds and exchange traded funds. The strategy is part of the broader BlackRock Multi-Asset Income suite of managed models and sits in the middle of the risk spectrum. The Team will seek to dynamically allocate to asset classes around the world that are deemed to offer attractive levels of income relative to the level of expected risk. MANAGER'S INVESTMENT PROCESS

- Investment views and portfolio exposures are driven by our proprietary fundamental and quantitative research processes which seek to analyze and understand the factors driving the broad direction of the macro-economy and asset classes. We employ both thematic, discussion-based forums and scientific, model-based techniques to develop our understanding of market fundamentals.
- The portfolio construction process is a combination of top-down investment decisions with bottom-up expertise, implemented through BlackRock mutual funds as well as proprietary and third-party ETFs. The top-down tactical asset allocation decisions are made by the Strategy's portfolio managers, who are supported by a group of dedicated research analysts within MAS.
- The portfolio managers also leverage dedicated asset class teams across BlackRock that are responsible for the bottom-up research and security selection decisions inside the mutual fund strategies. More formal levels of engagement include regular meetings with equity and fixed income teams as well as informal meetings with key analysts and portfolio managers across a wide variety of asset classes. This is an essential part of the research process and thus, every researcher's objective is to incorporate the best insights from around the firm.
- From a risk management perspective, each strategy is managed relative to a risk benchmark. In evaluating risk, the team principally utilizes three proprietary models (short horizon, mid horizon and long horizon) to evaluate the aggregate level of risk as well as to decompose the risk into component parts. The three risk models utilize varying half-lives to incorporate different volatility and correlations assumptions. The team also uses scenario analyses extensively (both historical examples as well as forward looking hypothetical scenarios) to assess performance in different market environments.




AVERAGE ANNUAL TOTAL RETURN (%) - PERIODS ENDING 03/31/18

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Alpha is a mathematical estimate of risk-adjusted return expected from a portfolio above and beyond the benchmark return at any point in time.

American Depositary Receipts (ADRs) are receipts for shares of a foreign-based corporation held in the vault of a U.S. bank.

Average Portfolio Beta is a measure of the sensitivity of a benchmark or portfolio's rates of return to changes against a market return. The market return is the S&P 500 Index. It is the coefficient measuring a stock or a portfolio's relative volatility.

Beta is a measure of the sensitivity of a portfolio's rates of return to changes in the market return. It is the coefficient measuring a stock or a portfolio's relative volatility.

Bottom-Up Stock Selection Emphasis primarily on individual stock selection. Considerations of economic and industry factors are of secondary importance in the investment decision-making process.

Capitalization is defined as the following: Mega (Above \$100 billion), Large (\$12 to \$100 billion), Medium (\$2.5 - \$12 billion), Small (\$.50 - \$2.5 billion) and Micro (below \$.50 billion).

Dividend a portion of a company's profit paid to common and preferred shareholders.

Downside Risk is a measure of the risk associated with achieving a specific target return. This statistic separates portfolio volatility into downside risk and upside uncertainty. The downside considers all returns below the target return, while the upside considers all returns equal to or above the target return.

Duration is a measure of price sensitivity expressed in years.

High Grade Corporate Bonds corporate bonds from issuers with credit ratings of AA or AAA.

Information Ratio is a measure of the investment manager's skill to add active value against a given benchmark relative to how stable that active return has been. Essentially, the information ratio explains how significant a manager's alpha is. Therefore, the higher the information ratio, the more significant the alpha.

Investment Grade Bonds are those rated by Standard & Poor's AAA (highest rated), AA, A or BBB (or equivalent rating by other rating agencies or, in the case of securities not rated, by the investment manager).

Price/Book Ratio (P/B) weighted average of the stocks' price divided by book value per share. Book value per share is defined as common equity, including intangibles, divided by shares outstanding times the adjustment factor.

Price/Cash Flow Ratio a ratio used to compare a company's market value to its cash flow. It is calculated by dividing the company's market cap by the company' operating cash flow in the most recent fiscal year (or the most recent four fiscal quarters); or, equivalently, divide the per-share stock price by the per-share operating cash flow.

Price/Earnings Ratio (P/E Ratio) shows the multiple of earnings at which a stock sells. Determined by dividing current stock price by current earnings per share (adjusted for stock splits). Earnings per share for the P/E ratio are determined by dividing earnings for past 12 months by the number of common shares outstanding. The P/E ratio shown here is calculated by the harmonic mean.

Price/Sales Ratio determined by dividing current stock price by revenue per share (adjusted for stock splits). Revenue per share for the P/S ratio is determined by dividing revenue for past 12 months by number of shares outstanding.

R2 (R-Squared)/Portfolio Diversification indicates the proportion of a security's total variance that is benchmark-related or is explained by variations in the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio measures the efficiency, or excess return per unit of volatility, of a manager's returns. It evaluates managers' performance on a volatility-adjusted basis.

Standard Deviation is a statistical measure of historical variability or spread of returns around a mathematical average return that was produced by the investment manager over a given measurement period. The higher the standard deviation, the greater the variability in the investment manager's returns relative to its average return.

Top-Down/Economic Analysis Emphasis primarily on macroeconomic trends as opposed to bottom-up stock selection.

Tracking Error represents the standard deviation of the difference between the performance of the investment strategy and the benchmark. This provides a historical measure of the variability of the investment strategy's returns relative to its benchmark.

U.S. Treasury Bonds a marketable, fixed interest U.S. government debt security with a maturity of more than 10 years. Treasury bonds make interest payments semi-annually and the income that holders receive is only taxed at the federal level.

Volatility a measure of risk based on the standard deviation of the asset return. Volatility is a variable that appears in option pricing formulas, where it denotes the volatility of the underlying asset return from now to the expiration of the option. There are volatility indexes. Such as a scale of 1-9; a higher rating means higher risk.
