PRODUCT OVERVIEW

Dorsey, Wright & Associates Systematic Relative Strength Core strategy is the basis of portfolio construction. Relative strength measurements are undistorted by emotion or personal bias. Dorsey Wright's Systematic Relative Strength Core strategy uses relative strength to maintain a portfolio with exposure to high relative strength stocks. The strategy seeks long-term appreciation by seeking out the strongest trends in the market.

MANAGER'S INVESTMENT PROCESS

- A top-down model, which looks at 10 economic macro sectors and 65 industry groups. Dorsey Wright looks for overall major trends. That top-down model is looking to identify the broad areas of strength in the market.
- Stock selection model, which is based on relative strength, ranks Dorsey Wright's universe of stocks and puts the strongest stocks from the strongest macro sectors into the portfolio. The bottom-up model selects the individual names for the portfolios, but Dorsey Wright is selecting those names from the strongest areas of the market.

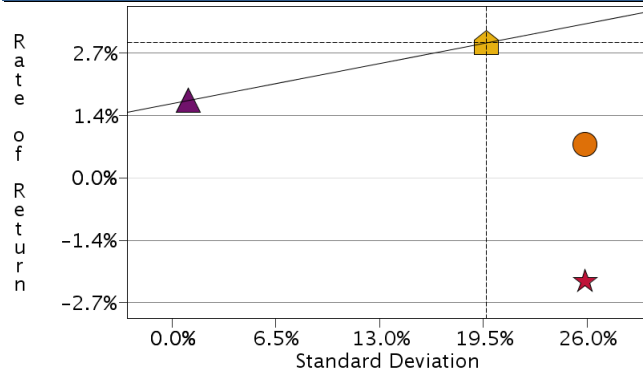

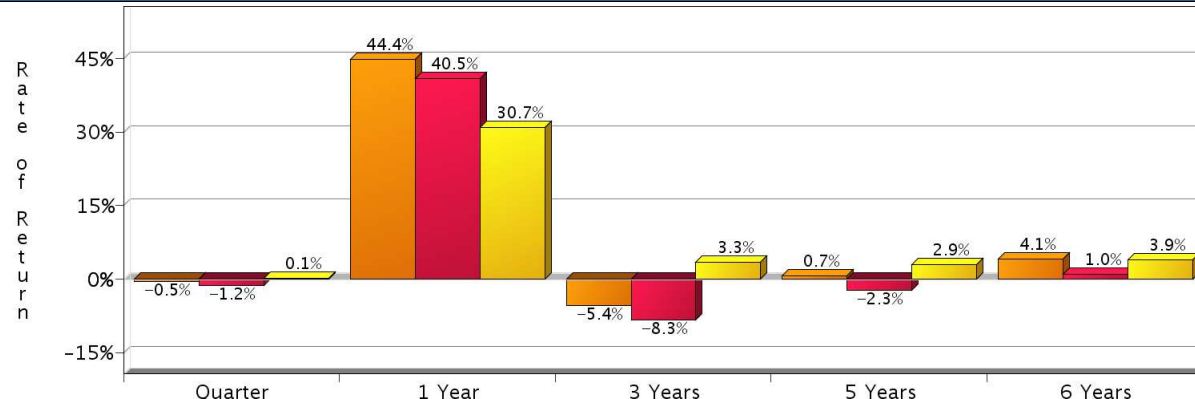

AVERAGE ANNUAL TOTAL RETURN (%) – PERIODS ENDING 06/30/11

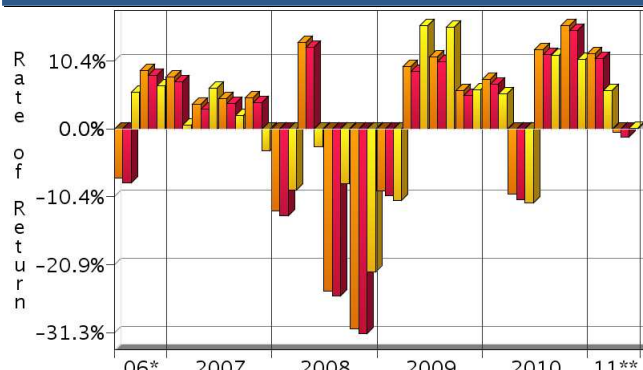

Gross Performance: Dorsey Wright's gross results do not reflect a deduction of any investment advisory fees or program fees, charged by Dorsey Wright or Morgan Stanley Smith Barney, but are net of commissions charged on securities transactions.

Net Performance for all Periods: Net performance results reflect a deduction of .7425% quarterly. This consists of three components: 0.625% maximum quarterly MSSB Advisory Fee and 0.03% maximum quarterly Program Overlay Fee (which, together cover the services provided by Morgan Stanley Smith Barney), plus .0875% quarterly SMA Manager Fees (being the fee currently charged by Dorsey Wright to new clients for managing their assets in the Select UMA program). INDEX DESCRIPTIONS

90-Day Treasury Bills

The 90-Day Treasury Bill is a short-term obligation issued by the United States government. T-bills are purchased at a discount to the full face value, and the investor receives the full value when they mature. The difference of 'discount' is the interest earned. T-bills are issued in denominations of \$10,000 (auction) and \$1,000 increments thereafter.

S&P 500 Index

Widely regarded as the best single gauge of the U.S. equities market, this world-renowned index includes a representative sample of 500 leading companies in leading industries of the U.S. economy. Although the S&P 500

focuses on the large-cap segment of the market, with over 80% coverage of U.S. equities, it is also an ideal proxy for the total market.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Alpha is a mathematical estimate of risk-adjusted return expected from a portfolio above and beyond the benchmark return at any point in time.

American Depositary Receipts (ADRs) are receipts for shares of a foreign-based corporation held in the vault of a U.S. bank.

Average Portfolio Beta is a measure of the sensitivity of a benchmark or portfolio's rates of return to changes against a market return. The market return is the S&P 500 Index. It is the coefficient measuring a stock or a portfolio's relative volatility.

Capitalization is defined as the following: Mega (\$50.0 billion and Above), Large (\$11.0 - \$50.0 billion), Medium (\$2 - \$11.0 billion), Small (\$500m - \$2 billion) and Micro (below \$500 million).

Downside Risk is a measure of the risk associated with achieving a specific target return. This statistic separates portfolio volatility into downside risk and upside uncertainty. The downside considers all returns below the target return, while the upside considers all returns equal to or above the target return.

Duration is a measure of price sensitivity expressed in years.

Information Ratio is a measure of the investment manager's skill to add active value against a given benchmark relative to how stable that active return has been. Essentially, the information ratio explains how significant a manager's alpha is. Therefore, the higher the information ratio, the more significant the alpha.

Investment Grade Bonds are those rated by Standard & Poor's AAA (highest rated), AA, A or BBB (or equivalent rating by other rating agencies or, in the case of securities not rated, by the investment manager).

Price/Earnings Ratio (P/E Ratio) shows the multiple of earnings at which a stock sells. Determined by dividing current stock price by current earnings per share (adjusted for stock splits). Earnings per share for the P/E ratio are determined by dividing earnings for past 12 months by the number of common shares outstanding. The P/E ratio shown here is calculated by the harmonic mean.

R² (R-Squared)/Portfolio Diversification indicates the proportion of a security's total variance that is benchmark-related or is explained by variations in the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio measures the efficiency, or excess return per unit of volatility, of a manager's returns. It evaluates managers' performance on a volatility-adjusted basis.

Standard Deviation is a statistical measure of historical variability or spread of returns around a mathematical average return that was produced by the investment manager over a given measurement period. The higher the standard deviation, the greater the variability in the investment manager's returns relative to its average return.

Tracking Error represents the standard deviation of the difference between the performance of the investment strategy and the benchmark. This provides a historical measure of the variability of the investment strategy's returns relative to its benchmark.
