PRODUCT OVERVIEW

The Small/Mid Cap Equity strategy is a diversified, quality oriented portfolio that is managed with a long-term time horizon. The team uses a fundamental, bottom-up approach to identify businesses the team believes possess quality management teams, favorable industry dynamics and attractive or improving financials, and seeks to invest in companies that are trading at meaningful discounts relative to intrinsic value. Research is generated using both qualitative and quantitative inputs to develop an in-depth understanding of individual businesses. The portfolio consists of 80-120 holdings and limits cash to less than 5.0% of the portfolio. Sectors are limited to +/-10% of the weight in the benchmark. The strategy is designed to maximize long-term capital appreciation, while seeking to mitigate risk over complete market cycles. Investment returns should be measured against the Russell 2500 Index over multi-year time periods. The portfolio turnover is expected to range from 20-30% on an annual basis. The strategy is managed by two Portfolio Managers with support from four research analysts. Portfolio Managers Dave Adams and Jack McPherson are ultimately responsible for all Small/Mid Cap Equity portfolio decisions. Their investment decisions include portfolio allocation, construction, research and security selection responsibilities. Investment decisions are derived from research generated by all analysts on the research team, including both Portfolio Managers.

MANAGER'S INVESTMENT PROCESS

- The majority of ideas for the strategy comes from the due diligence meetings that the team conducts throughout the research process. As research analysts increase their knowledge of a given company or industry through meetings with the management team, peers/competitors, customers, distributors and suppliers, or through attending industry conferences, the analysts may be introduced to a new investment candidate that could fit our discipline. This type of in-the-field research can uncover unique ideas that may be ignored by investors relying solely or primarily on traditional quantitative screens.
- Analysts will also screen their areas of coverage to identify additional investment candidates. These screens may be based on valuation, profitability, growth, cash flow or quality metrics, among others. Screens are industry specific and customized by each analyst. The screening process is not exclusionary and is meant to provide analysts with a better understanding of the businesses operating within their area of sector coverage.
- The team seeks to invest in companies they believe can create shareholder value, where analysts have identified a high probability of improved growth and profitability. Analysts focus on the firm's management team, industry dynamics and financial health, preferring companies whose durable operating business models can allow them to withstand the negative effects of business cycle volatility.
- Once strong candidates are identified, the team creates detailed valuation estimates based on the business' enterprise value relative to its long-term normalized earnings power. This analysis incorporates an assessment of the stock's historic absolute valuation range, valuation relative to the broader market and valuation relative to its peer group.
- We carefully and continually review holdings to ensure our investment thesis and the criteria for investment remain intact. As part of our ongoing research, our analysts update fair value estimates as new, material data become available and as our understanding of individual businesses evolves.






AVERAGE ANNUAL TOTAL RETURN (%) - PERIODS ENDING 06/30/20

The Small/Mid Cap Equity Composite (the "Composite") includes all discretionary accounts managed in this strategy. The objective of the Small/Mid Cap Equity strategy is to optimize long-term returns versus the Russell 2500 Index with a focus on mitigating market risk. This strategy focuses on high-quality U.S. businesses and ADRs which appear to be trading at a discount to fair value and have a typical market capitalization of range of \$500 million to \$10 billion. The Composite was created in January 2008. A list of composite descriptions is available upon request. Composite and benchmark returns reflect the reinvestment of income. Composite returns are presented gross and net of actual investment advisory fees. Gross of fee composite returns are calculated after the deduction of all trading expenses and in some cases, custodial and administrative fees. 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INDEX DESCRIPTIONS

90-Day T-Bills

The 90-Day Treasury Bill is a short-term obligation issued by the United States government. T-bills are purchased at a discount to the full face value, and the investor receives the full value when they mature. The difference of discount is the interest earned. T-bills are issued in denominations of \$10,000 auction and \$1,000 increments thereafter.

Russell 2500

The Russell 2500 Index measures the performance of the 2,500 smallest companies in the Russell 3000 Index, which represents approximately 16% of the total market capitalization of the Russell 3000 Index.

S&P 500

The S&P 500 Total Return has been widely regarded as the best single gauge of the large cap U.S. equities market since the index was first published in 1957. The index has over \$5.58 trillion benchmarked, with index assets comprising approximately \$1.31 trillion of this total. The index includes 500 leading companies in leading industries of the U.S. economy, capturing 75% coverage of U.S. equities. This index includes dividend reinvestment.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Alpha is a mathematical estimate of risk-adjusted return expected from a portfolio above and beyond the benchmark return at any point in time.

American Depositary Receipts (ADRs) are receipts for shares of a foreign-based corporation held in the vault of a U.S. bank.

Average Portfolio Beta is a measure of the sensitivity of a benchmark or portfolio's rates of return to changes against a market return. The market return is the S&P 500 Index. It is the coefficient measuring a stock or a portfolio's relative volatility.

Beta is a measure of the sensitivity of a portfolio's rates of return to changes in the market return. It is the coefficient measuring a stock or a portfolio's relative volatility.

Bottom-Up Stock Selection Emphasis primarily on individual stock selection. Considerations of economic and industry factors are of secondary importance in the investment decision-making process.

Capitalization is defined as the following: Mega (Above \$100 billion), Large (\$12 to \$100 billion), Medium (\$2.5 - \$12 billion), Small (\$.50 - \$2.5 billion) and Micro (below \$.50 billion).

Distribution Rate is defined as the most recent distribution paid, annualized, and then divided by the current market price. Distribution rate may consist of investment income, short-term capital gains, long-term capital gains, and /or returns of capital.

Dividend a portion of a company's profit paid to common and preferred shareholders.

Dividend Yield annual dividend per share divided by price per share. Dividend Yield for the portfolio is a weighted average of the results for the individual stocks in the portfolio.

Downside Risk is a measure of the risk associated with achieving a specific target return. This statistic separates portfolio volatility into downside risk and upside uncertainty. The downside considers all returns below the target return, while the upside considers all returns equal to or above the target return.

Duration is a measure of price sensitivity expressed in years.

High Grade Corporate Bonds corporate bonds from issuers with credit ratings of AA or AAA.

Information Ratio is a measure of the investment manager's skill to add active value against a given benchmark relative to how stable that active return has been. Essentially, the information ratio explains how significant a manager's alpha is. Therefore, the higher the information ratio, the more significant the alpha.

Investment Grade Bonds are those rated by Standard & Poor's AAA (highest rated), AA, A or BBB (or equivalent rating by other rating agencies or, in the case of securities not rated, by the investment manager).

Price/Book Ratio (P/B) weighted average of the stocks' price divided by book value per share. Book value per share is defined as common equity, including intangibles, divided by shares outstanding times the adjustment factor.

Price/Cash Flow Ratio a ratio used to compare a company's market value to its cash flow. It is calculated by dividing the company's market cap by the company' operating cash flow in the most recent fiscal year (or the most recent four fiscal quarters); or, equivalently, divide the per-share stock price by the per-share operating cash flow.

Price/Earnings Ratio (P/E Ratio) shows the multiple of earnings at which a stock sells. Determined by dividing current stock price by current earnings per share (adjusted for stock splits). Earnings per share for the P/E ratio are determined by dividing earnings for past 12 months by the number of common shares outstanding. The P/E ratio shown here is calculated by the harmonic mean.

Price/Sales Ratio determined by dividing current stock price by revenue per share (adjusted for stock splits). Revenue per share for the P/S ratio is determined by dividing revenue for past 12 months by number of shares outstanding.

R2 (R-Squared)/Portfolio Diversification indicates the proportion of a security's total variance that is benchmark-related or is explained by variations in the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio measures the efficiency, or excess return per unit of volatility, of a manager's returns. It evaluates managers' performance on a volatility-adjusted basis.

Standard Deviation is a statistical measure of historical variability or spread of returns around a mathematical average return that was produced by the investment manager over a given measurement period. The higher the standard deviation, the greater the variability in the investment manager's returns relative to its average return.

Top-Down/Economic Analysis Emphasis primarily on macroeconomic trends as opposed to bottom-up stock selection.

Tracking Error represents the standard deviation of the difference between the performance of the investment strategy and the benchmark. This provides a historical measure of the variability of the investment strategy's returns relative to its benchmark.

U.S. Treasury Bonds a marketable, fixed interest U.S. government debt security with a maturity of more than 10 years. Treasury bonds make interest payments semi-annually and the income that holders receive is only taxed at the federal level.

Volatility a measure of risk based on the standard deviation of the asset return. Volatility is a variable that appears in option pricing formulas, where it denotes the volatility of the underlying asset return from now to the expiration of the option. There are volatility indexes. Such as a scale of 1-9; a higher rating means higher risk.
